After 11 long, hot years in the Tucson area, Pat and Don Young returned to Colorado, acknowledging that the warmer climate had not really helped Don's Multiple Sclerosis as they'd hoped.

He admits he enjoyed the warmer temps, and Pat admits she did not. Eleven years was an honest tryout.

They're back, this time choosing Evergreen to be closer to family, as many people do in their later years. Rocky Mountain Village's proximity to their son and 15-year-old granddaughter helped seal the deal.

Prior to Tucson, they had lived in Woodland Park.

Although Don had been born in Pittsburg and Pat in Springfield, Illinois, both families had relocated to California early enough that the coastal state became "home" for them.

Pat's dad had experienced Southern California's Mediterranean climate mid-winter as a sailor docked in the deep harbor naval port. Observing kids in the ocean and playing in shorts — a sharp contrast to the cold, snowy winters of the Midwest — he'd had a life-defining moment, returning to Illinois announcing to his wife, "We're moving to San Diego!" So, as Pat says, she became "one of them."



Waterskiing was one of her favorite activities growing up, a sport that continued after getting married. Their boat was named "Pat's Pride."

Don's father's work was cause for the family to relocate to the San Gabriel Valley, living primarily in San Marino.

Don's uncle (Pat's employer) introduced the couple, and within a year they were married. Pat was a stay-at-home mom, raising their two boys and complementing that role by being a teacher's helper and a part-time secretary.

Over the years she worked as a high-impact aerobics instructor and manager of a stencil company, giving classes in the art. While living in Woodland Park, she started her own stenciling business.

In Tucson, she joined a group of quilters 10+ years ago and learned to piece colorful fabrics by machine; a variety of her quilts adorn their entryway at Bergen, changing regularly. "I wanted to finish a quilt started by my grandmother," Pat explains as her motivation, "but I still haven't finished it because it would require hand quilting."

Pat knits and crochets — on a limited basis, she points out — donating her simple creations to the homeless.
