Meet Tom and Mary Kay Barnes

Tom and Mary Kay Barnes walked down the aisle together twice – first in 1977 when they met at his brother’s wedding – she was a bridesmaid and he a groomsman. They married a year later, making the walk a second time, and they’ve been together ever since.

They spent much of their lives in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan before relocating to Evergreen eight years ago. Marquette, on Lake Superior, presented them with lots of opportunities for outdoor activities as they raised their two daughters. And they’ve continued to enjoy the out-of-doors here in Colorado, frequently camping. “It makes it easy to walk out the door,” Mary Kay said of their one-bedroom condo in Genesee. “Actually, we love living in a small place,” about one-third the space they had previously.

The couple had always camped with their kids, generally with a boat, canoe, or kayak as part of the package. “We had a real tent on the ground until January – now we have a car tent with a mattress,” they explained. “Every place we go here is wonderful – a different kind of wonderful than the UP.”

Since January they’ve been to seven states, camping on BLM (Bureau of Land Management) lands. “Everything runs on solar-charged battery – the kitchen, shower, bathroom,” they say of the modern conveniences that have made camping more comfortable over the years. Their longest stint at camping is three months, often enjoying wildlife preserves where they’d not see people for days. “We could get the radio if the wind was blowing the right direction.” Generally, there’s no



cell phone reception. “We love to bike, snow bike, and mountain bike.”

As a Registered Nurse, Mary Kay worked in obstetrics at the health center in Marquette, proud of having delivered 11 babies over the years while working nights. “All 11 were rapid-finish babies,” she pointed out. Being home while raising children held a high priority, but her training came in handy as she served as Camp Nurse when the girls attended multiple camps. “The kids, dog, and cat got to go with me,” she added. During that period she taught childbirth classes and volunteered for many years at the crisis pregnancy center in Marquette as both a nurse and a counselor. Nowadays, she’s involved in an ecumenical pregnancy crisis center in Denver.

Tom, who’d been born in the UP but had grown up in Pontiac, about 35 miles from Detroit, worked on the assembly line for General Motors for five years before becoming part of the sheet metals union and starting the roofing business he had for 25 years. He would wind up coaching track and field as a volunteer at a Catholic school and later taking a paid position coaching cross country skiing and Nordic skiing for the women’s division of Northern Michigan University.

As with most athletic teams, coaches set goals for their teams each year. But Tom’s goals were a bit different from most. Instead of aiming for placement in the top three or setting a certain number of records, Tom set goals based on a list of virtues, starting with “kindness.”

They ended up buying a condo in Genesee and settling in at Christ the King Catholic Church for their spiritual home. “Back then we were called ‘the kids,’ ” because they were among the youngest in the building Mary Kay said, adding, “now we’re blending in.” They enjoy being close to family and grandchildren in Evergreen, and their kids who live in Illinois love traveling to Colorado to visit.

“I don’t think there are better neighbors than people who have lived a long time,” they say. “They have more wisdom than we have. And Evergreen is the best!”
