## Meet Kitty Larson

In keeping with customs at the time, many people with long family names or double names had them shortened before the ink dried on the birth certificate. Margaret Katherine became Kitty before she knew it. “I remember they’d pat me on the head and say ‘good kitty’ when I was young.” She’s lived her life as “Kitty,” and that’s how we’ve known her since she moved into Bergen eight years ago.



Rocky Mountain Village may have a rule about “just one cat,” but Kitty Larson’s place is overrun with hundreds. She keeps most of them contained in a curio cabinet in the living room, but some spill over onto other pieces of furniture with dozens on the bed. Not a single one requires a litter box. There’s not a cat hair to be found, and neighbors never complain of meows.

When she started dating her husband-to-be, he gave her a ceramic kitten, the start of what’s become a large a collection of feline likenesses.

Having grown up in a hamlet in northern Virginia — Middelburg, the Nation’s Horse and Hunt Capital and now home to many wineries — Kitty didn’t venture too far for nursing school in Washington, DC. Then it was a three-year program to become a registered nurse, the first year taking college courses, and the next two years gaining practical experience at Garfield Memorial Hospital.

She recalls renting canoes with friends and rowing

down the Potomac River, visiting the museums and memorials, enjoying the cherry blossoms in the spring. “It was a walkable city, and there were so many historical places to visit,” but noted that there were many cautions to young women about crime. “The dangers of living in a big city were quite different after growing up in a small town like Middleburg with a population of just 1,000.”

She recalls being one of many who’d stand on the street to catch a glimpse of famous people who’d come to visit the President when Eisenhower was in office in the 1950s. “There’d be a parade of cars with a couple of famous people....”

She met her husband-to-be during her four-year stay in DC. After they married, her nursing degree helped him finish schooling at Northwestern to become a dentist. They’d moved back to his hometown of Chicago and then on to a small town in Wisconsin before they decided small towns weren’t for them. Rochester, MN posed some opportunities for a dentist, and they relocated there around 1960.

It was in Rochester that the Larsons raised their four children. Kitty stayed at home while their daughter and three sons were young but took a job at a small county hospital after the kids had grown. “Nursing helped a lot in raising four kids,” she adds.

Since her husband’s idea of a vacation was fishing in Minnesota, Kitty’s opportunity to travel didn’t come until later when she and her daughter visited faraway places like Hong Kong and Australia. Her daughter and son-in-law own and operate a small beach hotel in Belize, and Kitty’s been there several times in the past decade when she still felt comfortable traveling alone. Having two sons living in Colorado

is what brought her to Evergreen after her husband passed away. She'd spent 40 years in Rochester.

She attends Bible Study on Wednesday evenings and appreciates the fact that her church is so close by.
